## **MINUTES**

### I. <u>CALL TO ORDER/ROLL CALL</u>.

Vice-Chair Nolan called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

**II.** <u>**PUBLIC COMMENT</u>** - The following citizen addressed the Commissioners:</u>

<u>Ron Phillips</u> – Rural Human Services (RHS) – due to the CDGB funding made available to RHS, there is a need for more storage space for the food. Mr. Phillips stated that what is needed is a 20' refrigerator and 20' dry storage container. Since there are no ordinances in place to regulate this, he asks for his request to be an agenda item for an upcoming meeting. *Planner Taylor stated that staff will do research, write a report and bring it back to the Commission for further discussion on allowing it or not.* Mr. Phillips stated that come the first of the year, they will need more storage space.

#### III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Approval of the minutes of the regular meeting of August 9, 2012.

On a motion by Commissioner Inscore, seconded by Commissioner Gastineau and carried unanimously, the Planning Commission of the City of Crescent City approved the regular meeting minutes of August 9, 2012, as presented.

#### IV. PUBLIC HEARINGS

A. Project: ER12-01 Environmental Review for the Front Street Redesign project.
 Applicant: City of Crescent City Location: Front Street from A Street to L Street
 APN: N/A

Associate Planner Taylor reported to the Commission regarding the necessary requirements for this project; it has been published for public comment; and to date there were no comments in the period required (or at all); this is for the approval of the negative declaration.

On a motion by Commissioner Gastineau, seconded by Commissioner Inscore, and carried unanimously on a 3-0 polled vote, the Planning Commission of the City of Crescent City approved the negative declaration of project ER12-01, Front Street Redesign.

### V. <u>REGULAR ITEMS</u>

A. Project: AR12-10 Architectural Review for the construction of a 6463 square foot retail auto parts store located in the General Commercial (C2) District.
 Applicant: Autozone Inc. Location: NWC of Cooper Avenue and Highway 101 APN: 118-360-15

Associate Planner Taylor explained what is allowed on this piece of property; it meets all the requirements for the location. The parking space requirement is 25 spaces; however, there is only room for 20. Planner Taylor told the applicant that if the plan is approved, it will be with the requirement to have 25 spaces, and he advised the applicant to come back to the Commission for a reduction of spaces requirement. He further explained that the applicant will have a garbage bin that will lock with a block walls around it, a pole sign which will be 16' high located on the highway. There was an architectural review; and no additional comments came out of the meeting. Due to the size of the company that is requesting this store, it is understood that they have a lot of experience in building these properly. The conditions of approval are as follows: file after the 10 day period to file for exemption of the CEQA requirement, to come back to the Commission for the reduction of parking, 6' cement wall around garbage, and to get permit for sign, water quality permits, discharge permits to be obtained as required. Planner Taylor went over the plans with the Commission and described them in detail and what requirements have already been met by Auto Zone.

Commissioner Gastineau asked when will they be shovel ready; Planner Taylor advised it is unknown at this time, however they are working with an Engineer and will find out soon, all depends on the winter we'll have. Vice-Chair Nolan asked about access to the site coming thru Auto Zone, is it necessary to have an additional turn off from Cooper needed; Planner Taylor stated that they have an access easement therefore no additional driveways are necessary.

On a motion by Commissioner Inscore, seconded by Commissioner Gastineau, and carried unanimously on a 3-0 polled vote, the Planning Commission of the City of Crescent City approved the AR12-10 Architectural Review for the construction of a 6463 square foot retail auto parts store located in the General Commercial (C2) District.

### VI. <u>REPORTS, CONCERNS, REFERRALS</u>

Planner Taylor reported to the Commissioners the recent Beachfront Park Master Plan Workshop for which several members of the public attended and provided input. In regards to Top Blue Marine, he went and noted they had drains leading to the storm drains; he explained to them that they cannot allow anything to go into the storm drains. Planner Taylor reported that funding was awarded for the RV Park, notification from the EDA was received and there is a conceptual plan, but will go out to an outside consultant for a finalized one. He stated that the old Burl shop should be coming down soon – the asbestos report came back in and it has a small amount on the roof, the fire department will be burning it down soon after the asbestos is contained.

Commissioner Gastineau asked for the status of the old Ice Plant and the new hotel; Planner Taylor said they have removed Ice Plant as they said they would. Commissioner Gastineau also asked about Ocean Front Lodge; Planner Taylor stated an amended permit was approved, however no construction started yet. Commissioner Inscore asked if Top Blue Marine will have things completed in 30 days; Planner Taylor stated that they are hopeful, but it's up in the air; especially with the current situation of the Tri-Agency.

### VII. <u>ADJOURNMENT</u>

There being no further business to come before the Crescent City Planning Commission, Vice-Chair Nolan adjourned the meeting at 5:56 pm to the regular meeting on November 8, 2012.

#### **Background & Project Description:**

The City of Crescent City has prepared the Front Street Redesign project plans which were presented to the Planning Commission in March of 2012. The Front Street Redesign project includes narrowing the street to a two lane roadway, adding additional parking on the south side of the street, a roundabout at A Street, public art and landscaping. The proposed project is subject to review under the California Environmental Quality Act and a Negative Declaration (State Clearing House # 2012082082) has been prepared for the project (refer to attached Negative Declaration for further details). 


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A records check of the subject property was conducted by North Coast Information Center staff on August 6, 2012 (Taylor 12-02). The records search indicated that there have not been any archaeological surveys conducted in the project site. However, the records check uncovered two previous surveys that were conducted in the vicinity which did not result in the identification of any archaeological or historic sites. The records search did mention that there were recorded historic resources in the vicinity but did not mention what those were.


Given that the project area consists of a paved roadway there is little expectation that any intact cultural or historic resources will be uncovered during construction. The project site contains no known paleontological resources or unique geologic sites. No human remains are likely to be encountered due to the fact that the property is made up of reclaimed tidal lands. In the event that archaeological remains or artifacts are uncovered during any construction or landscaping activities, work shall be stopped and a qualified archaeologist shall survey the site. The archaeologist shall submit a report with recommendations on the disposition of the site. Disposition may include, but is not limited to, excavation and documentation, capping the site, or leaving the site in an open space area. The recommendations of the archaeologist shall be incorporated in the project.


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
